### Legacy Member Breaks Record as Youngest National President:

Madeline Rock of the Margaret M. Orr Circle #105 of Ohio was elected for the high office of National President at the 137th National Convention in Aurora, IL. Having served in most Circle Offices, and a few Department Offices before the Department folded, she has



served at the National level of the Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic, Inc. as National Secretary for 3 consecutive years, as Sr. Vice Pro-tem for multiple years, Editor of the Bugle Call for 4 terms, and held appointed responsibilities such as social media manager, LBNCC liaison for 2 terms, and presented our organization with our National Project "Pets for Vets" along with the designs and items for fundraising purposes for this project over the course of 6 years. Madeline has been an active lifetime member so far, with 3 Past National Presidents in her immediate family, as well as a great aunt and great grandmother. She holds the title for the Youngest National President having served the LGAR, with her grandmother, Lynne Bury, holding the title until now (served as NP at age 39). Madeline has donated 39 hours for the creation of our Sandusky,

Ohio Museum Room, and has given many hours each year to the benefit of our organization in this capacity. Additionally for 5 years Madeline assisted with the National Archives Project by working on the scanning at the Cleveland Public Digital Library.

Madeline joined the Ladies of the G.A.R. under her great uncle Martin P. Durkee, who served in the 29th OVI from Geauga County Ohio. She has several Civil War ancestors and has been able to visit where many of them served on various battlefields across the country.

Outside of LGAR, she serves on the nonprofit board for her family's nationally historic landmark, the Zimmerman-Bury Octagon House Association, and volunteers many hours to this property. She owns her own apothecary business, and works in an administrative position at her local fitness center. Her volunteer work has included yearly hours at her local community and preservation center, and gives time to the United States Army Brotherhood of Tankers nonprofit, assisting in fundraising for their Helping Hand Fund. Madeline has been raised in Civil War reenacting and living history activities in

general, which have spawned a love of history for America. She will continue to remain active with her home LGAR Circle, and intends to work closely with Miss Sawyer's "Kids with a Cause" nonprofit, as well as "Pets for Vets" projects and our new National Headquarters Museum in the coming year.



In 2023 the parade down main street and services were, as always, conducted at the Ripley Cemetery by the LGAR and other veterans organizations. The Ladies rode in the annual parade to the cemetery. When they arrived they laid a wreath at the Ripley monument to the brave troops of the war of the Rebellion. The Chaplin read a prayer. Approximately 300 people attended this service. This monument was erected in 1909 with efforts of the Women's Relief Corp. In 2009 the Ladies of the Grand Army Department of Minnesota raised funds to refurbish the monument. After the ceremony a picnic


was held at the Litchfield Opera House by the Meeker County Historical Society and the Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic. The Frank Daggett Circle #105 baked 36 pies and served at the annual picnic. Donations

were gathered that paid for all the food. 230 tickets were sold and a profit of just over \$3,000 was realized. This is a fund raiser for the Meeker County Historical Society who cares for the Grand Army of the Republic Memorial Hall.

The Ladies also decorate the graves



of the 96 Civil War veterans buried at Ripley Cemetery. The G.A.R. was instrumental in starting this Cemetery Association with the guarantee that all veterans regardless of economic status, faith or race would be buried with a marker. ### LGAR Announces New Headquarters Museum

Our new National Headquarters & Museum will now be housed in the historic 1834 Liverpool Town Hall in downtown Valley City, Ohio. Originally called Liverpool Township, this township is the oldest continuously inhabited township in Medina County, Ohio & is about 20 miles south of Cleveland. Liverpool Township was the first permanent settlement in Medina County. In 1795 township property owner Daniel Coit was part of the Connecticut Land Company, which had bought the Connecticut Western Reserve for about 40 cents an acre. The Western Reserve was land set aside by the Continental Congress for payment of Revolutionary War Soldiers in lieu of wages.

Edward Heath also a native of Connecticut, first surveyed Liverpool Township. At this time the Township was wilderness abounding with wild beasts including bears, wolves, deer and otters. The Village of Liverpool Center (now Valley City) was laid out in 1834 by Abraham Freese, a surveyor. Twenty-five lots were originally laid out, but increased to Fifty-seven by 1854. Many businesses flourished in Liverpool. There were sawmills, blacksmiths, dry goods, saloons, foundries, gristmills, cloth manufacturing, tanneries, a tin shop, a gun shop, and numerous cheese factories. It is said that there was more



manufacturing done here than in Medina which is the county seat.

Our Headquarters Museum is located in the original Town Hall for Liverpool, which has also served as the first high school with a class of 5 graduates. Liverpool School was opened around 1900 and was used until December of 2003. Remaining as Liverpool Township, the town is now Valley City, known for being "The Frog Jump Capital of Ohio." Since 1962, it has held an annual contest patterned after Mark Twain's story, "The Celebrated Jumping Frog of Calaveras County." Progress and a belief in the future seem to have been bywords for Valley City's ancestors. From the changes now in place since the 1950's, it would seem this philosophy has been carried down together with a love for community and old-fashioned values as Liverpool Township continues to grow beyond its population of 5,750. The Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic, Inc. look forward to serving it's members with a quality museum that shares our history as well as being relevant to our projects of today. Plan your visit in 2024 when the museum opens, and make sure to register early for our next National Convention held here.

# William Boone Keith Circle #3 Historic Memorial Day Service at Woodlawn Cemetery

The historically established May 30 Memorial Day was conducted by several genealogical groups in honor of two Civil War soldiers buried at the cemetery. The Sons of the



Union Veterans of the Civil War with Commander Kurt Dunphy presiding, and William Boone Keith Circle #3 Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic President Shirley Dunphy presiding, conducted their annual Memorial Day Celebration on May 30 at 12 PM.

Dr. Linda Miller, a Daughters of the Union Veterans member from Elizabeth Benton Fremont Tent #79 and William Boone Keith Circle #3 member, portrayed Helen J. Stewart, who in 1914 along with other prominent ladies in Las Vegas, persuaded the railroad to donate ten acres of land for a city cemetery. She described in Helen's words how the cemetery would be decorated.

In this historic ceremony which has been celebrated for decades, each group presented wreaths to honor the two Civil War Soldiers William Boone Keith (LGAR Circle #3 namesake), Union Soldier and Joseph Moore Graham, Confederate Soldier, who lie side by side.

A few years after the Civil War ended, the men moved to Las Vegas, leaving their families behind and became good friends. When Graham died, Keith purchased a plot for both himself and Graham. Keith had Graham's wife's (Julia) remains sent to Las Vegas to be buried next to her husband. The two veterans from opposite sides of the conflict share a common tombstone. It is believed to be the only grave in the country with a Confederate and Union soldier laying side by side.

The ceremony was also dedicated to the memory of Em and Len Becker. In 1997, Em, President of the Daughters of Union Veterans Elizabeth Benton Fremont Tent #79 and her husband Len, of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War Camp #12, placed a monument between the graves of the two Civil War Soldiers. They were caretakers of the monument until their death a few years ago. Their young relatives attended this ceremony.



### National Encampment Patriotic Lesson: Pledge of Allegiance

"I pledge allegiance to my Flag and the Republic, for which it stands,—one nation, indivisible—with liberty and justice for all."

This was the original Pledge of Allegiance written by Francis Bellamy in 1892. He was a minister from New York and worked for The Youth's Companion, a Boston based magazine.

Bellamy's "Pledge of Allegiance" was part of The Youth's Companion's National Public-School Celebration of Columbus Day, a celebration of the 400<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Christopher Columbus arriving in the Americas. James B. Upham, a marketer for the magazine, conceived a campaign to instill American nationalism in students and to encourage children to raise flags above their schools. He and Bellamy had arranged for Congress and President Benjamin Harrison to announce a proclamation making the public school flag ceremony the center of the Columbus Day celebrations. This arrangement was formalized when President Harrison issued Presidential Proclamation 335.

The Pledge was first used in public schools on October 12, 1982, during the Columbus Day observances coinciding with the opening of the World's Columbian Expedition, also known as the Chicago World's Fair. It was to be quick and to the point. Bellamy designed it to be recited in 15 seconds and accompanied by a non-military style hand salute.

By the 1920s, the first National Flag Conference, the American Legion, and the Daughters of the American Revolution recommended changes to the pledge intended to clarify its meaning when recited by immigrants. Since the pledge as then written didn't mention the flag of any specific country, those organizations expressed concern that the immigrants might feel they are pledging allegiance to their native country rather than the U.S.

In 1923, the "my" was dropped and the phrase "the Flag" was added, resulting in "I pledge allegiance to the Flag and the Republic, for which it stands – one nation, indivisible—with liberty and justice for all." A year later, the National Flag Conference added "of America," to completely clarify the issue. Congress officially recognized the Pledge for the first time, on June 22, 1942, in the following form:

"I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America, and to the Republic for which it stands, one nation indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

Another amendment to the Pledge wouldn't come until the 1950s. This Cold War era left many Americans wanting to distinguish the Unites States from the state atheism promoted by Marxist-Leninist countries. That led to the support for the words "under God" to be added to the Pledge of Allegiance.

While the Daughters of the Revolution and the Sons of the Revolution used the words "under God" before their meetings, it wasn't until the Knights of Columbus adopted a resolution urging that the change be made universal in 1952. They sent copies of the resolution to the President and began petitioning Congress to add the phrase. U.S. Representative Louis C. Rabaut, a Democrat from Michigan, was persuaded by the petition, and introduced legislation to add the phrase to the pledge.

Before February 1954, no endeavor to get the pledge officially amended had succeeded. That was until on Sunday morning, when President Eisenhower heard a sermon from Reverend George Docharty based on the Gettysburg Address entitled "A New Birth of Freedom." Eisenhower urged Congress to amend the Pledge, citing Lincoln's words "under God" as defining words that set the US apart from other nations.

The phrase was incorporated into the Pledge of Allegiance on June 14, 1954 by a Joint Resolution of Congress amending § 4 of the Flag Code enacted in 1942. Which now reads:

"I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America, and to the Republic for which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible, with Liberty and justice for all."
