Lincoln Birthday Ceremony in D.C.

The annual Lincoln Birthday Ceremony at the Lincoln Memorial in Washington, D.C., has been a significant tradition since the memorial's dedication in 1922. Each year on February 12, this event honors President Abraham Lincoln's legacy through a wreath-laying ceremony, speeches, and performances. The ceremony is organized by the National Park Service and the Lincoln Birthday National Commemorative Committee, with participation from organizations like the Military Order of the Loyal Legion of the United States (MOLLUS).

In 2009, during the bicentennial of Lincoln's birth, the ceremony included performances by singer Michael Feinstein and the U.S. Marine Corps Band, with remarks from figures such as Illinois Senator Dick Durbin and poet Nikki Giovanni, with speaker Gordon Bury of MOLLUS. There have been many notable guests over the years including Marian Anderson, Martin Luther King Jr., and many Senators, Representatives, musicians, and more.

This annual observance serves as a reminder of Lincoln's enduring impact on the nation and provides an opportunity for citizens to reflect on his contributions to American history.

Although the official ceremony was cancelled by the Park Service, meaning no program or chairs, it didn't stop LGAR from braving the weather to honor the 216th Birthday of Abraham Lincoln at the Lincoln Memorial in D.C.

National President Erin Mongelli laid the wreath with the assistance of Marine Corps Veteran Brandon Ervin. Also in attendance were PNP's Madeline Rock and Beth Null.

The importance of this anniversary and the tradition of honoring this great President at this monumental memorial mean so much to the LGAR, and we are proud to have been represented properly on this day!



National Convention at Fort Snelling

1. Observance of Patriotic Holidays - All members are encouraged to observe Memorial Day, along with other patriotic holidays throughout the summer season. Let us continue to honor the legacy of those who served with reverence and unity.
2. Submission of Service Reports - All Circles should have received reporting forms from their Department or from National. Please take the time to submit your hours of service. If you require assistance with the reporting process, do not hesitate to reach out to either myself or the National Secretary. We strive for all Circles and Departments to be acknowledged in our report to Congress.
3. Cybersecurity Awareness – Phishing Alerts - Please remain vigilant against phishing emails—deceptive messages crafted to obtain sensitive information such as passwords or financial details. These messages may appear to come from organization officers but are sent by cybercriminals. Note: We will never request gift cards, and rarely will we initiate urgent communication that relies solely on email. If a message seems suspicious, contact us directly using verified contact information. (Do not reply to the suspicious email itself.)
4. Support for Small or Struggling Circles - If your Circle is experiencing challenges or has limited membership, please contact our Registrar and the National Secretary. We are committed to supporting our sisters and strengthening our community.
5. Membership Expansion and Formation of New Circles - Members who do not have a local Circle are welcome to join as Members-at-Large (MAL) or to affiliate with any Circle that aligns with their interests. There is interest in forming new Circles in North Carolina, Maine, Wisconsin, and Utah. A minimum of 10 members is required to establish a new Circle. Let's continue to

John Logan's Order

I. The 30th day of May, 1868, is designated for the purpose of strewing with flowers or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion, and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village, and hamlet churchyard in the land. In this observance no form or ceremony is prescribed, but posts and comrades will in their own way arrange such fitting services and testimonials of respect as circumstances may permit.

We are organized, comrades, as our regulations tell us, for the purpose, among other things, "of preserving and strengthening those kind and fraternal feelings which have bound together the soldiers, sailors, and marines who united to suppress the late rebellion." What can aid more to assure this result than by cherishing tenderly the memory of our heroic dead, who made their breasts a barricade between our country and its foe? Their soldier lives were the reveille of freedom to a race in chains, and their death a tattoo of rebellious tyranny in arms. We should guard their graves with sacred vigilance. All that the consecrated wealth and taste of the Nation can add to their adornment and security is but a fitting tribute to the memory of her slain defenders. Let no wanton foot tread rudely on such hallowed grounds. Let pleasant paths invite the coming and going of reverent visitors and found mourners. Let no vandalism of avarice or neglect, no ravages of time, testify to the present or to the coming generations that we have forgotten, as a people, the cost of free and undivided republic.

If other eyes grow dull and other hands slack, and other hearts cold in the solemn trust, ours shall keep it well as long as the light and warmth of life remain in us.

Let us, then, at the time appointed, gather around their sacred remains and garland the passionless mounds above them with choicest flowers of springtime; let us raise above them the dear old flag they saved from dishonor; let us in this solemn presence renew our pledges to aid and assist those whom they have left among us as sacred charges upon the Nation's gratitude, -- the soldier's and sailor's widow and orphan.

II. It is the purpose of the Commander-in-Chief to inaugurate this observance with the hope it will be kept up from year to year, while a survivor of the war remains to honor the memory of his departed comrades. He earnestly desires the public press to call attention to this Order, and lend its friendly aid in bringing it to the notice of comrades in all parts of the country in time for simultaneous compliance therewith.

III. Department commanders will use every effort to make this order effective.

Appomattox Luncheon with PA Department

Department of Pennsylvania President, Shirley Dines and Senior Vice-President Debra Miller attended Appomattox Luncheon 2025 on April 12th at the Hoss' Restaurant in Grove City, PA. This is an annual Sons of Union Veterans event to commemorate the anniversary of the end of the war. It was hosted by the Isaac Eaten Camp No. 504 of Mercer, PA. Author Lori Tillia-Meeker was the guest speaker. She spoke about her research on the hospitals of Gettysburg for her book, "Where Have All the Hospitals Gone? The Aftermath of the Battle of Gettysburg". The afternoon was a

great opportunity to enhance the working relationship with the Allied Orders of Pennsylvania.



Beyond the Battlefield: Civil War Life at Home

The National Headquarters & Museum will launch its 2025 special display, Beyond the Battlefield: Civil War Life at Home, on April 27th. This exhibit explores the war's impact on soldiers, civilians, and enslaved people, offering a deeper understanding through personal artifacts and stories.

Our Museum Civil War Display in 2025 tells the story of George Metcalf who lived near our LGAR Museum in Liverpool Township from 1844 to 1880. He wrote a full 234 pages describing his life, but featured 30 pages encompassing his life as a Civil War soldier during the Battle of Gettysburg. George enlisted as a Civil War Soldier in Company D of the 136th NY Volunteer Infantry, and during the Gettysburg Campaign was in the 2nd Brigade, 2nd Division of the 11th Army Corps. Local Historian, Rod Knight, was generous to share George's story with us, and if you attend the annual Remembrance Day celebrations in Gettysburg this November, please join us, and as we visit the locations across the battlefield where George fought. Friday, November 14 beginning at noon.

From George's vantage point of Pickett Charge on July 3rd... "From noon till 3 o'clock. We lay awaiting the outcome of this artillery duel. It came. All firing seats on both sides. All was deadly stillness. After such roaring and thundering in our ears, the silence that came was awful. It seems so still that you could almost hear one's heartbeat. The infantry were soon on their feet. The smoke began to rise and clear away. And then came to us the reason why so much smoke in artillery was necessary by the enemy; for under its cover, generally had marched his troops from our right to the left center, unseen, and was preparing to make a third charge upon our line. In front of us was a large tract of farming land, such as would be found in any farming community. We Fields, cornfields, Meadows, and pastures, and in the rear of all a long line of woods, something like a mile away. Out of these woods came forty thousand men divided into three or four columns, each about six rods in advance of the other. As far as the eye could reach to the right or left these columns extended. They came slowly toward our line, keeping step with their guns at right shoulder shift. Their flags were flying in the breeze by the thousands. The higher grade of officers were in the rear on horseback. Orderlies were flying here and there, carrying the commands from the Commander-in-Chief of the whole force down to the lines. It would have been a beautiful site to behold to one who did not know their mission. But to us who lay in their line of march it was not so pleasant."
