General Orders No. 2, 2021-2022

Happy New Year! Your National President wishes to thank you for the beautiful Christmas thoughts expressed by cards during this holiday season. I extend cordial greetings to all members of our beloved Order, and sincere good wishes to all. As we stand on the threshold of the New Year, let us pledge ourselves anew to the Veterans whose names we so proudly bear, and do all in our power to assist current Veterans in our noble work. As a patriotic Order we must not abate one instant in our efforts to do our part now.

1. You will see the details on the cover of this issue for our 2nd annual Online Trivia Party set for February 20th. Please form your teams or join another team and help us with this national fundraiser. This is a huge boost to our yearly budget and the trivia is suitable for all ages with a variety of topics. If you are in need of a team to join, please email our National Sr. Vice Beth Null and she can assist you. We had favorable participation last year, but this year we would like to see many more of our members participate. So pour a cup of tea, and come join us on February 20th.
2. It's that time again for yearly Reports and Per Capita to the National Organization. All Department and Circle under National Secretaries will be receiving the yearly packet of report blanks from the National Secretary. If you are new to serving as a Secretary, please reach out to the National Secretary to learn the process. You can also view our instructional video and print off more reports from our "Forms and Report Blanks" website page. Per Capita is due to National Secretary on May 15th and all Reports are due to National Secretary by July 1st. It is important that all members participate in submitting their service hours to be included on these yearly reports. These reports

- still go to Congress to maintain our Congressional status.
3. Plans are underway for our National Convention in Gettysburg, PA from August 11-13. Full details are in this issue and registration is now open. Your Ohio hosts have planned many wonderful things for this special convention and please note that the schedule is altered a bit due to some amazing opportunities. I hope that you will get registered, send delegates from your Circle or Department, and start planning early. You won't want to miss this year.
4. This General Order must share a few words to express a little of the feeling very near my heart. Do we fulfill in letter and spirit the obligations of our Order: Has all that has been done by each of us been only what seemed for the best interests of our organization? Do we at all times sink self and self-seeking, working for the greatest good of all? I do not wish to say a discouraging word, I delight in all the good we do, in all the reports of progress that shall be made. Yet I think I express the feelings of many when I say I have been heart sick often and almost discouraged, when I have heard of these petty troubles that threatened the structure of our organization, powerful enough to overthrow the work that years of patient, faithful work has been building. Is it not time for serious thought for the good of all? In the precious time of these days together we should think of what is left undone, and do away with the what spurs the spirit of jealousy. When we follow our Bylaws and rules of the Order, and begin to scale such heights, then our numbers and our work will multiply with professional behavior for our nonprofit.
5. On the happiest of notes, I share that 2 new Circles are forming in PA and will hopefully be ready to institute at the National Convention. We bid these new members a warm welcome and wish them much success with their future endeavors.

upon, purchased, and sold as a fundraiser for the DUVCW without first seeking authorization from the LGAR to use our emblem or name.

This action is in direct violation of our Bylaws: Chapter VI, Article 1, Section 6 "Exclusive right to name, seals, emblems and badges.

The corporation and its subordinate divisions have the exclusive right to use the name Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic."

This action is also in direct violation of our Federal Charter: Per our US Code Title 36, Subsection 2, Part B, CH. 1301, Section 130101, Section 16: Use of name, corporation and sub division, sole right to use name Ladies of the GAR...

The Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic, Inc. Advisory Council, found the following Department of PA LGAR Officers in violation of one or more of our Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic, Inc. Constitution and Bylaws:

Kathleen Wible

Guilty of failure to adhere to lawful order from the National Organization.

Guilty of seeking and paying for legal counsel from Department funds prior to taking proper action towards settlement with the National Organization.

Guilty of creation of new 501C3 without first seeking governance from the National Organization

Guilty of negligently misrepresenting the Department of PA LGAR in its filing as an unincorporated association.

Guilty of Filing of Articles of Incorporation for the Department of PA LGAR without first seeking governance from the National Organization.

Guilty of Representing the Department Organization in public while the Department Charter is suspended

Guilty of encouraging members to seek honorable discharges, and encouraging members to stand in opposition to the National Organization.

Guilty of violating the membership oath and the oath of office.

Each of these offenses warrants Dishonorable Discharge for life from the Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic, Inc. under Chapter VII Article I Discipline Section 1 sub section b. Discipline under Section 2 sub section a. With Advisory Council of the National Organization being the highest level of the organization with members reviewing all documents and voting unanimously, per Chapter VII, Article 1, Section 3, this is a case deemed unnecessary to convene a court of inquiry.

The National Advisory Council has allowed the Department of PA to be remanded to a provisional condition, under Bylaws Chapter V, Article III, Section 3. This will allow the Department of PA LGAR remaining members 60 days to have a meeting, and elect new officers, and work with the National Organization to rescind the 501C3 and abandon their new 2016 Corporation.

Travels Continued:

As I continued with my travels post convention September was a lost month full of household illness. October arrived and my husband and I made the long journey to Colorado with a few stops along the way. We visited the Pilot Knob battlefield, another ball of twine, and various scenic stops, but the highlight en- route was stopping to visit with the members of the Livermore Circle in KS. These ladies treated me with lunch, toured me around to the center of the US, gave much fellowship, and will be recognized in August for the great work they are doing to gain new members. As one of our oldest Circles in the country that formed in the 1880s for Veteran relief, these ladies are going strong and I am forever grateful for their warm welcome. We continued our drive thru KS with high winds and tornado watches to arrive safely at Fort Carson, CO for most of a week. I was blessed to have my daughter and her boyfriend meet us in CO. The days were spent with close to 100 Veterans, and I gave time to fundraising for this group of United States Army Brotherhood of Tankers. We raised several thousands of dollars for USABOT and still managed to visit the National Museum of WWII Aviation, the tank range at Fort Carson (where I actually got to get into the drivers seat of an operational tank}, a drive thru Pike's Peak, and a view of a plethora of tanks because after all, the family that tanks together stays together. Our drive home included a stop in NM, TX, OK, and a short visit at the Branson, MO Military Museum and Veteran's Memorial Garden along with the Wilson's Creek Civil War Battlefield.

November began with participation in the Disabled American Veteran Walk, Run and Ride 5K for Veterans in the names of the Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic, Inc. We chose the virtual option for participation, and began at the Ohio Veterans Memorial Park and proceeded with our 5K in the area. Thank you to our members that signed up and donated or participated to this worthy cause. Veterans Day ceremonies were attended with 4 of our National Officers in Massillon, Ohio at the American Legion, followed by a stop at the Western Reserve National Cemetery and time with my Veteran husband. The following weekend National Historian Lynne Bury and National Treasurer Jan Stevenson, traveled with me to Elkhart, Indiana to support the Arsinoe Martin Circle's spaghetti dinner fundraiser. This fundraiser supported their cemetery restoration mission. The following day I was honored to represent the LGAR and attend a ceremony to place a new G.A.R. grave marker for medal of honor recipient Abraham Greenawalt hosted by the McClellan Auxiliary to the SUVCW in Alliance, Ohio and was treated to a lovely afternoon and lunch. And of course November also included the annual trip to Remembrance Day in Gettysburg, where I was happy to attend the 158th anniversary of the Gettysburg Address ceremony hosted by the Lincoln Forum at the cemetery where Stephan Lang gave the address. This was such a

fantastic ceremony I will be encouraging others to attend next year, and to get involved by helping to hand out programs or do whatever we are needed to help with. I realize this day is always very, very busy and this year was no different. LGAR hosted a memorial service at the Copse of Trees on the morning of the 20th, and this started our day off with many blessings and 2 new members. These 2 new members then marched with LGAR in the annual parade. Our activities did not end there. While most people conclude the day with dancing at balls or going out to dinner to enjoy, those in attendance with me once again spent the afternoon helping to set up the luminaries at the National Cemetery, and then returned after grabbing a quick dinner to take a couple of hours working at the entrance gates welcoming visitors or to read off the names of these Veterans interred there. This is always a favorite activity for our family that we cherish each year. Last but not least, I sent supplies and baked goods out once

again to Miss Sawyer's Kids with a Cause nonprofit for her annual Christmas stockings that she sends to the military all around the world.

December found me gathering supplies for the tornado affected areas of KY. As we know several areas were hit hard and our members rallied and sent boxes like I did, or even loaded up trailers to deliver in person. Thank you to those members that reached out to me such as Linda Manning, and supported my mission to send what we could on such short notice.

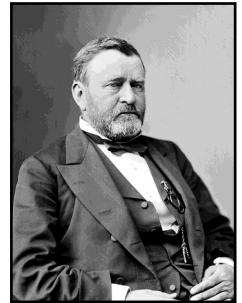

Ulysses S. Grant 200th Birthday

For those that are unable to attend an official ceremony paying tribute to General Grant, we provide for you a simple ceremony that your Circle or Department Members can do in your location.

- ◆ Chaplain: Almighty God, we thank Thee for Thy sovereign care and protection, in that Thou didst lead us in the days that were shadowed with trouble, and gave us strength when the burden was heavy upon us, and gave us courage and guidance, so that after the conflict we have come to these days of peace. We thank Thee that the wrath of war has been stilled, that brother no longer strives against brother, that once again we have one country and one flag.
- ◆ Patriotic Instructor: Lead the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.
- ◆ Sr Vice: We assemble here today to celebrate the 200th birthday of Ulysses S. Grant, born on April 27, 1822. In 1865, as commanding general, Ulysses S. Grant led the Union Armies to victory over the Confederacy in the American Civil War. Grant was later elected the 18th President of the United States (1869–1877), working to implement Congressional Reconstruction and to remove the vestiges of slavery. Grant belonged to the Military Order of the Loyal Legion of the United States (MOLLUS), the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War (SUVCW) and the Aztec Club of 1847. He served as the Aztec Club's president for three non-consecutive terms from 1951–52, 1953–54 and 1955–56.
- ◆ Jr. Vice: The son of a tanner, Grant showed little enthusiasm for joining his father's business, so the elder Grant enrolled his son at West Point in 1839. He went on to serve in the Mexican-American War, and to fulfill a tour of duty in California and Oregon. At the outbreak of Civil War he re-enlisted in the army in 1861 and embarked on a stellar military career. In 1862, he led troops in the captures of Forts Henry and Donelson in Tennessee, and forced the Confederate Army to retreat back into Mississippi after the Battle of Shiloh. Grant's talent as a political leader paled woefully in comparison to his military prowess. He was unable to stem the rampant corruption of his administration and failed to combat a severe economic depression in 1873. There were bright spots in Grant's tenure, however, including the passage of the Enforcement Act in 1870, which temporarily curtailed the political influence of the Ku Klux Klan in the post-Civil War South, and the 1875 Civil Rights Act, which attempted to desegregate public places such as restrooms, inns, public conveyances on land or water, theaters, and other places of public amusement. Grant spent the last few years of his life writing a detailed account of the Civil War and, after he died of throat cancer in 1885, Julia lived on the royalties earned from his memoirs.
- ◆ President: May thy blessing be upon us as a people, that we may be thy people, true and righteous in all of our ways, tender and patient in our charity, though resolute for the right; careful more for the down-trodden than for ourselves, eager to forward the interests of every citizen throughout the land, so that our country may be indeed be one country from the rivers to the seas, from the mountains to the plains. We place these flowers in loving memory of and in birthday celebration of Ulysses S. Grant.
- ◆ Chaplain: O God, teach us to honor our dead by serving the country of which they died; O God, teach us to be grateful to our dead for what they wrought for us by our ready helpfulness of those, the wife and orphan, whose right it is to mourn. O God, teach us to decorate the graves of our dead not only with a tribute beautiful and fragrant, that must fade, but with that fraternity whose love shall endure, with that charity that is fruitful of good works, with that loyalty which, while true to our country's flag, is supremely devoted to the cross, the symbol of our faith.

Eligibility VS Archives

An excerpt from part of one chapter of our new to be published LGAR History

After several years of discussion the Ladies of the G.A.R. voted to become an "Order of Records" at the 28th National Convention in 1914. Other organizations such as the DAR were having similar discussions and arrived at the same decision. Although the goals were the same, each organization achieved its goal with very different methods and produced far different results. Our first National Registrar was Belle S. Herr of CA who was appointed to start the process of collecting and recording the eligibility of each member—both past and present. This proved to be an uphill battle. Each Department was instructed to appoint a Registrar to collect the information from Circle Secretaries who were the keepers of all members' applications within the Circle. Record books called "proposition books" were made available for purchase by the Circles to record eligibility of each member and the information was to be forwarded to the Dept which should be reported to the National Registrar. The process had a slow start since Mrs Herr had to track down the Circle Secretary's through the Dept Secretary's. By 1919 the Registrar personally copied over 12,000 records onto the proper report blanks and found missing information for nearly 4,000 members. To this end the 35th National Convention voted to require each applicant to submit a certified copy of her Veteran's record of service along with her application. By 1924 with over 75,000 records now on file the office of Registrar finally became an elected office rather than just an appointment. These records and this office changed each year at election time. By 1939 a new typewriter and a steel cabinet file with 13 double drawers which would hold 60,000 index size cards was acquired. Right up to today the Circles remain responsible for investigating the eligibility of their members, as well as the storage of their applications, with a copy going to the National Registrar that is entered into our National Archives and placed in our Museum HQ. As you can see, this organization has **NEVER** required birth certificates and death certificates etc. for each generation going back to the actual Civil War Veteran, but rather trusted that each Circle Registrar has done her duty to ensure the membership application is correct. *By Lynne Bury*

From Title 4, Chapter 1 of Flag Code During the ceremony of hoisting or lowering the flag or when the flag is passing in a parade or in review, all persons present in uniform should render the military salute. Members of the Armed Forces and veterans who are present but not in uniform may render the military salute. All other persons present should face the flag and stand at attention with their right hand over the heart, or if applicable, remove their head-dress with their right hand and hold it at the left shoulder, the hand being over the heart. Citizens of other countries present should stand at attention. All such conduct toward the flag in a moving column should be rendered at the moment the flag passes.

REMEMBER: When laying a wreath, it doesn't matter what the individual that is laying the wreath for you tells you, if you are a civilian, meaning you have never served in the U.S. Military, you CANNOT RENDER A MILITARY SALUTE. Instead, you must render the civilian salute, which consists of taking a step back, placing your right hand over your heart for a few seconds, lowering it, and walking away.
